Distinguishing Normal Aging From Incapacity



Normal Aging

Normal and gradual process that affects the body and its functions as a whole, varying from one person to another. Normal aging is not synonymous with vulnerability or incapacity.

- Memory problems of varying degrees
- Decline in ability to assimilate or understand new concepts
- Reduced physical functions
- Difficulty concentrating
- Difficulty finding the right words
- Momentary forgetfulness of specific events

ATTENTION:

The decline of intellectual faculties is often slight, does not affect daily life, varies from one person to another, and is minimal for the majority of aging clients.

Incapacity

Inability of a person to express his/her will due to a significant deterioration of his/her cognitive faculties.

- Memory loss
- Difficulty understanding simple or
- somewhat complex concepts
- Weight loss, physical deterioration
- Misunderstanding or forgetfulness
- Difficulty speaking
- Unusual behaviour

ATTENTION:

The presence of some or many of these signs does not necessarily imply incapacity.
